Student Engagement at the Forefront

It has been a fantastic and productive school year with many great things to celebrate. Our students, teachers, support staff and administrators are just simply amazing! Students and teachers have been engaged in new initiatives centered on improving writing skills and the culture and climate in each building. We have provided a plethora of professional development opportunities to support our teachers in using strategies to deliver highly effective instruction. Our teaching and learning is designed to be more relevant to the interests and learning styles of children in the 21st century.

In an effort to enhance the Salmon River climate and culture, the staff has actively participated in presentations with national motivational speakers such as John Antonnetti. Teachers are focusing on improving student engagement, as well as, rigor and relevance in their instruction. In addition, Dave Weber has spoken twice on topics related to enhancing the culture and climate. Weber uses humor and directness to model various approaches to dealing with students and staff situations, how we choose our words, modeling positive interactions, and extracting leadership qualities that exist in each and every staff member.

Our partnership with Clarkson University continues to support secondary math and special education teachers in engaging students in the real world applications of mathematics. The district-wide technology committee has created a budget and plans to rollout laptops for grades 6-12 students. The goal is to affect two grade levels per year over the next several years, eventually meeting a 1:1 ratio. Similar technology exists for students in the elementary building and upgrades are provided each year.

The Salmon River District focus will continue to be about improving writing skills for students in grades K-12. Writing instruction has changed in grades K-8 and now involves students taking charge of their own learning through individual conferences. A new program called Second Step for social and emotional learning for grades Pre-K-8 has been implemented as well. The high school incorporates civility within their lessons to meet social and emotional learning standards.

The second year of our Empire Grant programming has enabled us to provide many fun after school and summer activities for students, enhancing learning in creative ways, such as Junior Iron Chef (3rd place at Northern Area Competition), STEM Robotics, theater, homework club, and yoga.

Overall, we are excited to be providing an outstanding learning environment for our students and we look forward to another incredible school year in 2019-2020!



THREE PART BUDGET


Capital costs include the salaries and benefits of maintenance and custodial staff, plus debt service, bus purchases, utilities, general insurance, tax certiorari and other court-ordered costs.

Administrative costs include the salaries & benefits of all certified staff who spend 50% or more time in administration. 

Bus Proposition

A proposition on May 21st will ask voters to approve the purchase of four 66-passenger school buses and one 12 passenger van at a cost not to exceed \$500,000. The state reimburses the District for 90% of bus purchases, therefore the local taxpayers' share of the total would be an average less than \$9,000 for a five year period.



CBWEP

The Community Based Work Experience Program (CBWEP) is designed to give students an opportunity to develop job readiness skills for the world of work. Currently 23 students participate in the program. In-house jobs include making and selling popcorn, helping in the cafeteria, delivering mail and working in building libraries. Students also work the Salmon River School Store and one student is at Ellis Automotive in Malone. As part of our financial literacy component, students are paid for their jobs and are shown how to cash their paychecks, keep a bank statement and budget their money.

Ratika:ratons ne Ionkhihsothokon:'a (Grandparents Stories) is a video project that will be developed by using guided interviews with fluent Mohawk speakers. The



goal is to video record guided interviews that will coincide with basic Mohawk conversation by speakers who are completely fluent and natural speakers. The intention of the interviews is to capture segments of important vocabulary and conjugation, involving various subjects.

5th Graders Write to Argue ▼

Students in the 5th grade learned about argumentative essay writing with a topic that hit close to home. Elementary Principal Mr. Barkley composed a letter to the students suggesting that recess be removed from 5th grade to allow for more educational time. He modeled a fantastic letter, supporting his choice with evidence, and concluded it with an invitation for the students to respond and persuade him to change his mind. 5th grade teachers read the letter aloud to students, which obviously resulted in an eruption of frustration!

Mrs. Cromie and Ms. MacCue encouraged students to discuss the idea with their peers and compose a "T-chart" on the positive and negative impacts this would have on the students.

Next, both teachers researched and printed out articles supporting the pros and cons of recess in schools and laid them out on tables for students to analyze. Students highlighted the supporting research and completed graphic organizers before starting their rough draft letters.

After the graphic organizers were completed, students had to write a rough draft. They conferenced with a peer and completed a peer edit. The next step led them




Blue-Bots


